August is a big month for Extreme Theater in NYC, as two hundred of the best emerging theater, dance, and multimedia performance troupes descend on Manhattan's Lower East Side for the muchanticipated fifth annual New York International Fringe Festival. Since its inception, the festival has introduced New York audiences to over 600 shows from around the globe, and many have gone on to become big hits, including the Off-Broadway sensations "The Last Train to Nibroc," "Never Swim Alone," and the Broadway-bound musical "Urinetown" (which you heard about first in the pages of Shout last year). Plus, the Theater for the New City does more than break down the "fourth wall" by staging performances at outdoor spaces throughout the city.

Companies from over 16 US cities and 17 countries bring some of the most experimental and controversial contemporary theater in the world to the stages and streets of our city. Among the

many Fringe 2001 highlights are a stage version of the classic porn film Debbie Does Dallas performed by NYC's own Slow-Eyed Productions and a one-man Swiss adaptation of Jim Carroll's junkie-searching-for-purity

novel, The Basketball Diaries. But what may be even more enticing than these more traditionally staged

shows, is Fringe Al Fresco, the street theater portion of the festival. This year's Al Fresco promises everything from full outdoor productions to a motley assortment of jugglers, fire eaters, human statues, stilt walkers, and freaks roving the streets of the Lower East Side throughout the duration of the festival. There's also an exciting new addition to the Al Fresco events this year: the revival of the Present Company's Public Works

Program. An activist performance group, The Public Works have planned several events to take place throughout the summer, including a theatrical assault on Wall Street workers, an invasion of MTV's "Total Request Live" involving people wearing bright orange T-shirts reading "I Will Wrestle Carson Daly for 20 Bucks," and sidewalk performances of the final scenes of Disney Musicals during the
